#### NHSCR Background

Background information on the NHS Central Register is available from National Records of Scotland's website - http://nationalrecordsofscotland.gov.uk/statistics-and-data/nhs-central-register/about-the-register

The Register is confidential, accessible only to a list of bodies approved by the Scottish Parliament and set out in the Local Electoral Administration and Registration Services (Scotland) Act 2006 (LEARS Act). The act and its associated schedules sets out the information that the Registrar General can hold in the NHSCR and who this information can be shared with. The information provided to these bodies is the minimum necessary for them to do their work. So, for example, local authorities are not provided with the indication of cancer.
