

Subject: Information on WWI soldiers and suffragettes in Inverness Prison Registers

## Information requested:

Access to the following closed prison records in connection with an exhibition on the impact of World War I on the Highlands:

NRS telephoned on the 2 October to discuss the request and see if the scope could be narrowed down. We agreed that the interest related to WWI soldiers and suffragettes only, and that the requester did not wish to see all of the information within these records. NRS agreed to inspect the records to see if they contained any details about these classes of individuals and explained that under FOISA the Scottish Prison Service (SPS) is responsible for decisions on access to these records, and that if NRS identified any relevant information NRS would ask SPS if this could be released.

In a second telephone call on the 1 November it was highlighted to the requester that the prison register indexes (HH21/64/1-2) contain very little information – only prisoner name, age, height, where born and prison registration number. In addition, NRS advised the requester that we found details of one individual in the Register of Sickness (HH12/93/3) who was almost certainly a soldier. At the conclusion of the second conversation it was agreed that the details about this individual in the Register of Sickness (HH12/93/3) was the only information requested under FOISA.

## NRS Response:

SPS has agreed to release the information about the soldier, Samuel Stewart. A transcription of the entry has been added below:
