

Transcription of Agnes Hugh's Declaration in the trial of culpable homicide, 10 November 1887, National Records of Scotland JC26/1888/1

At Dunfermline the tenth day of November Eighteen hundred and eighty seven In presence of David Gillespie, Esquire Advocate, Sheriff Substitute of Fife

Compeared a prisoner and the charge against her having been read over and explained to her and she having been judicially admonished and examined thereanent, Delcares: - My name is Agnes Lindsay or Cook or Hugh. I am fifty four years of age. I am the wife of Angus Hugh miner, Lochgelly, I am a certificated midwife - shown Diploma in favour of Mrs Cook bearer, to be signed by "Ch. Thatcher F.R.C. & E." dated July 26th 1882. which is docqueted & subscribed as relative hereto - That is my Certificate which was granted to me before I married my present husband. On the 31st of October I was in attendance on Mrs Ann Laing or Henderson in Lochgelly when she was delivered of a female child. All I've got to say is that whenthe child was born it cried once. When a child cries lustily you have to tie the ligature. All which is truth. I want to tell what I did that night. The baby cried once. I tried friction over the lungs to get it to breath. Then I applied the ligature – that means

the navel cord – I separated the child from the mother. The child gave two gasps. Then I got a basin & spirits & scrubbed the child.
