Transcription of letter from Reverend W. Chalmers Smith to Mr Buglass, Governor of Duke Street Prison, 6th November 1913.

Nov[ember] 6 1913
Dear Mr Buglass, I have just had a call from Detective Johnston who informs me that a letter to you as one of the Prisoner Commissioners relating to the state of my wife's health will deliver me from the infliction of detectives posted round my house.
I am writing this not on my own account for reasons you will understand.
My wife is still far from well. She is certainly better and is able to be up for a time everyday but is in a weak condition and very easily tired. She has not been downstairs yet and that fact alone is significant.
I wish the sentence had expired or was cancelled.
I am certain that on the present system she simply wouldn't survive.
Thank you for all your previous considerations.

Dear Mr Smith

I got your letter of 6th inst[ant] this morning on my return from a few days holiday.

I can quite appreciate your feelings in the matter of the police surveillance of your house.

The position of the matter is this:- an extension of the liberty granted to Mrs Smith would doubtless follow representations as to her state of health if supported by a medical certificate the terms of which should clearly indicate her present condition.

That I think might reasonably be done by yourself if other ways are out of the question.

I am sorry to learn from your letter that her health is still so unsatisfactory.
