Information requested:

Request for all the information NRS holds on William James Mckeown - in particular their NHS National Registration record and subsequent Central Register records and provided us with some personal details.

NRS Response:

While our aim is to provide information whenever possible, in this instance National Records of Scotland (NRS) does not have some of the information you have requested.

Family history information available online

You can use some of our online resources to research a family history. You can register for free on the ScotlandsPeople website at <https://www.scotlandspeople.gov.uk/> . This will allow you to search the indexes for the births, deaths and marriages. Civil registration started in Scotland in 1855. Whilst it is free to search the indexes, you need to purchase credits in order to view our historic records. However, if you want copies of modern day records, which are births that took place less than 100 years ago, marriages that took place less than 75 years ago and deaths that took place less than 50 years ago then you need to order an official certificate. The only other option to view the modern day certificates would be to visit our ScotlandsPeople search rooms here in Edinburgh or a Local Family History Centre, five of which are located around Scotland. There are also other types of record available on this website and these may be of interest to you if you start to search our historic records. You can usually order a certificate of an event through ScotlandsPeople at <https://www.scotlandspeople.gov.uk/>. If you prefer you can also order an official certificate through the National Records of Scotland (NRS) website at the link below. These certificates cost slightly more than the online certificates that can be ordered through ScotlandsPeople because the staff here carry out the search rather than yourself. If there is any dubiety as to whether the index shown on ScotlandsPeople is correct, we recommend that you order through NRS and provide all known information, including the death certificate.
