Access to 1973 Hamilton Sheriff Court records (SC37/55/21, items 318-321).

**NRS Response:**

A sensitivity review has been undertaken on this material by the Scottish Courts and Tribunals Service (SCTS). As a result of this, some information in the file has been redacted due to sensitivity issues.

Some of the redacted information relates to sensitive personal information of named individuals who are believed to be alive as statutory death certificates could not be traced for them. An exemption under section 38(1)(b) of FOISA applies to this information because it is personal data of third parties and disclosing it would contravene the data protection principles in Article 5(1) of the General Data Protection Regulation and in section 34(1) of the Data Protection Act 2018. This exemption is not subject to the 'public interest test', so we are not required to consider if the public interest in disclosing the information outweighs the public interest in applying the exemption.

In addition, some of the information contained in the file relates to the applicant. This information is exempt under section 38(1)(a) of FOISA (personal information of which the applicant is the data subject) and has thus also been redacted.

This file also contains information relating to a deceased person's health record. This information has also been redacted as an exemption under section 38(1)(d) of FOISA applies. There is a common law duty of confidence to patients and these ethical obligations extend even after the patient's death. The exemption under section 38(1)(d) is time limited to 100 years. This exemption is not subject to the 'public interest

test', so we are not required to consider if the public interest in disclosing the information outweighs the public interest in applying the exemption.
