


Letter from Captain John Sinclair, 79<sup>th</sup> Regiment

Ghent 28<sup>th</sup> May 1815  
My Dear Sister  
I have just arrived here  
and we march for Brussels in an hour  
every thing is hurry and confusion nothing  
but soldiers to be seen in this fine coun-  
try, we are told the army is in motion for  
the frontiers of France but of this  
you will know more than I do. When  
you see the newspapers I have not  
time to write more but to request you  
will let W<sup>il</sup>iam & all my friends know I  
am well. I will write the moment  
I have to spare to William
