Timeframe of data and timeliness	The estimates refer to the population as at 30 June each year. The estimates tend to be released 15 months after this date as other publications take priority.
Continuity of data	Data are available for the years 1981 to 2013.
Revisions statement	As a consequence of the method used, with each new year's data the estimates for previous years are revised. Revisions and corrections to previously published statistics are dealt with in accordance with the Scottish Government Statistician Group corporate policy statement on revisions and corrections - a copy of which is available on the Scottish Government website.
Concepts and definitions	A centenarian is a person aged 100 and over. The Population Estimates, on which these statistics are based, can be found within the Mid-Year Population Estimates section of the National Records of Scotland (NRS) website.
Relevance and key uses of the statistics	Scotland's population is ageing therefore estimates of the very old are important for policy development at a national level.
Accuracy	These estimates are broadly similar to comparable data from the Department for Work and Pensions and to the results from the 2011 Census.
Completeness:	The estimated very old population is on the same basis as the mid-year estimates i.e. if relevant at these ages the population

	<p>includes all those usually resident there, whatever their nationality.</p> <p>Students are treated as being resident at their term-time address.</p> <p>Members of UK and non-UK armed forces stationed in Scotland are included; UK forces stationed outside Scotland are excluded. Short-term international migrants are excluded.</p>
Comparability	Each publication includes a revised back-series for comparison as this is part of the method used. The estimates are consistent with the mid-year estimates the 90+ age-group.
Accessibility	It is the policy of the National Records of Scotland to make its website and products accessible according to published guidelines. More information is available in the Accessibility section of the NRS website.
Coherence and clarity	<p>The statistics are provided in Excel, PDF and CSV format. They are designed to be consistent and incorporate comparable historical data where appropriate.</p> <p>The methodology is the same as that used by the Office for National Statistics (ONS) and internationally to calculate estimates of the really old.</p>
Value type and unit of measure	Counts of males and females by single-year of age.

UK Statistics Authority Assessment	These statistics were assessed in 2011 by the UK Statistics Authority and are designated as National Statistics. The UK Statistics Authority will hold another assessment in 2014.
