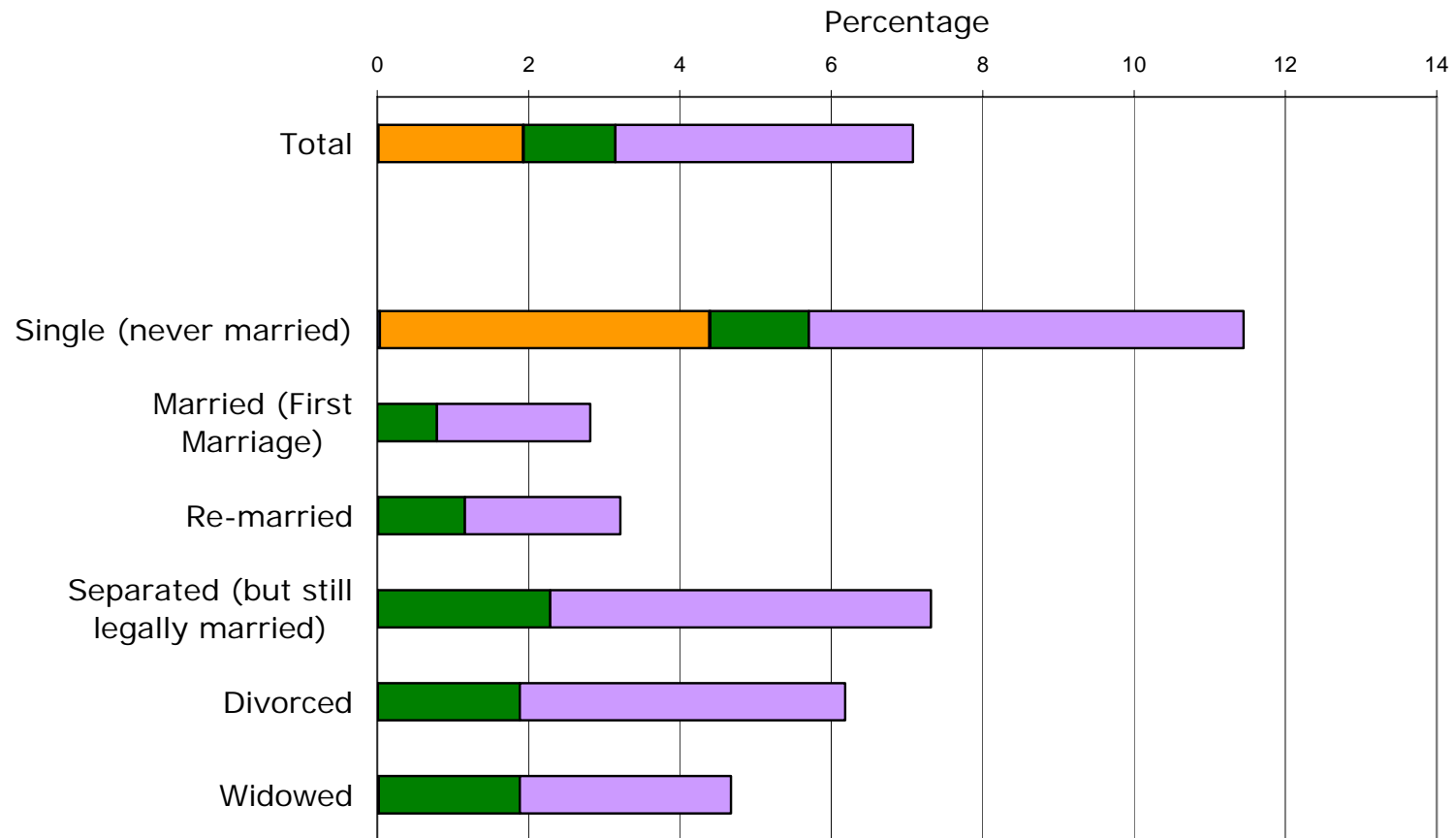

In a small proportion of cases, 'Single' replaced some other value given on the form that was inconsistent with other information.

Some 4.4 percent of persons counted as 'Single' in output had that value automatically inserted during the editing of the database. A very small proportion of cases spread across categories of marital status had values inserted when a check was carried out on couples recorded as being of the same sex.

In 1.2 percent of cases a person had a missing status imputed. This rate was lower for the two 'married' statuses, and highest (2.3 percent) for 'Separated'.

Persons imputed by the ONC process were most likely to have had statuses of 'Single' and 'Separated' assigned to them with 5.7 and 5.0 percent of the total population with these statuses being imputed. As for 'Missing value imputed', the lowest rates were in the 'Married' statuses.
