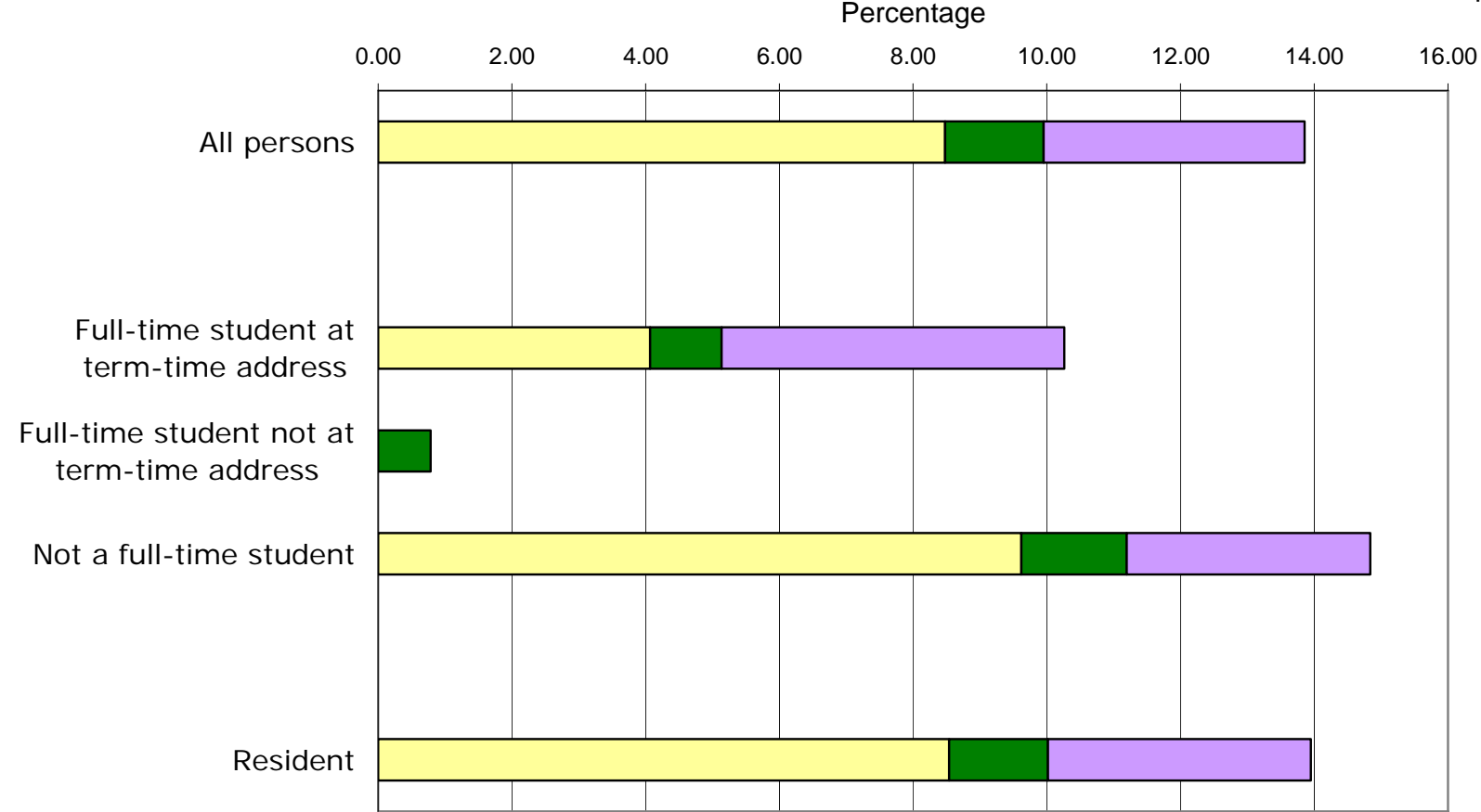

A person was counted as a resident at the address where he or she was enumerated unless he or she was a full-time student and lived elsewhere in term-time. A major part of the edit of each record was to assess the content of the student and term-time address questions (P5 and P6) and how fully questions following P6 had been answered. Students with term-time address elsewhere had only to complete questions up to P6. A child aged between 6 and 15 inclusive with no answer at P5, had an answer of 'Yes' (ie a full-time student) inserted by the edit process; also a term-time address of 'Yes' (ie lives at this address). For people outside the age range 6 to 15, if there was no answer at P5, but at least 3 of the questions following P6 had been answered, P5 had an answer of 'No' inserted. Of those in the final output database, 8.5 percent of persons had the answers to P5 or P6 created in this way. There were corresponding rates of 4.1 and 0.4 percent for full-time students at or not at their term-time address and 9.6 percent for people who were not full-time students. People counted as residents were full-time students at their term-time address and people who were not full-time students. The rate at which values for P5 or P6 were inserted automatically was 8.5 percent.

A percentage of 1.5 of all persons had the information missing imputed by donor rather than have a value automatically inserted. The rate for full-time students at their term-time address was 1.1 percent, less than the average.

There was a contrasting picture for imputation of person records by the ONC process with full-time students at their term-time address affected

more than average. 5.1 percent of students were added by the ONC, a rate higher than the average for all persons (3.9 percent).
